PROGRAM NOTES

by Richard H. Trame, S.J., Ph.D.

This evening's concert features two firmly established choral masterpieces of the twentieth century repertoire by two eminent composers whose ancestry and origins permit Switzerland to claim them as her contribution to modern music.

An oft-recurring phrase descriptive of Ernest Bloch (1880-1959) used by various biographers and commentators on his music is "remarkable." The expression aptly sums up aspects of Bloch's career and musical styles.

Although he was born in Switzerland, educated there, in Belgium and in Germany, he is often referred to as an American composer by reason of his naturalization, even though his music bears no discernible American characteristics. Indeed no discernible national features seem to inhere in his quite universal style.

Similarly remarkable is the fact that Bloch's Jewish music, the most famous being the Sacred Service and the Rhapsody for Cello and Orchestra called Schelomo, articulates musically his Jewish consciousness verbalized on occasion in his various statements. Eric Blom has noted that the Jewish character of his composition flows not from a superficial adoption of such elements as Hebrew songs and other readymade traditional material, but rather that it is such "because his artistic nature fitted him to give expression to the racial currents that flowed in his veins. He does so in a language that is his own and thus his music reflects as much his individuality as his race." Indeed, many of Bloch's other works, such as his opera Macbeth, his America and Helvetia, possess no recognizable Jewish character.

Remarkable too was the fact that Bloch had a number of outstanding American students — Roger Sessions, Walter Piston, Randall Thompson, and Halsey Stevens to name four — yet he did not impose on them any of his stylistic features. He adhered to no system and has no attachments to any theoretical preconception of school or method.

Perhaps most remarkable is the fact that Sacred Serivce (Avodath Hakodesh), composed between 1930 and 1933, is Bloch's only essay into large choral form. Unique among his own compositions, it likewise stands unique as the only large-scale liturgical composition of the Jewish worship service in the standard repertory comparable in size and stature to its more numerous Catholic and Protestant counterparts.

The Sacred Service requires an accomplished cantor and a sizeable mixed choir. A performance also embraces the spoken role of the rabbi. Frequently the phrases of the cantor are repeated or elaborated by the chorus. The work is in five movements corresponding to the liturgical divisions of the Morning Service as found in The Union Prayerbook for Jewish Worship.

Part One, designated Meditation, dwells

on those fundamental aspects of the Jews' inheritance and their relationship to God. Part Two, Sanctification, renders praise to the Almighty while affirming confidence in God as Helper and Merciful. The music for the ceremony surrounding the withdrawal of the Scroll from the Ark as symbolic of God's presence in the congregation constitutes Part Three. Part Four celebrates the return of the Scroll to the Ark and offers the prayer for peace. Part Five opens with an act of adoration and proceeds through the Kaddish or Memorial Service to the closing hymn and benediction.

The overall performance time of the work has some flexibility depending on the solemnity or brevity of the rabbi's invocations.

The cantor's and the choral parts are fixed. These in turn are supported and commented on by a symphony orchestra which Bloch uses deftly and with discreet attention to the often passionate expression of the aspirations and the sublime content of the Old Testament passages utilized. Sacred Service has long been recognized as a remarkable work.

Arthur Honegger's (1892-1955) King David (A Symphonic Psalm in Three Parts), appeared initially on June 11, 1921, as incidental music to a biblical play of that name by Rene Morax. Morax had established his "popular theatre" in the village of Mezieres in the canton of Vaud. To celebrate his theatre's reopening after World War I had forced its closure, Morax,

upon the advice of the eminent Swiss conductor, Ernest Ansermet, requested Honegger to furnish music for his play. Agreeing to accept this commission, Honegger composed within two months a setting for fifteen instrumentalists. Its success at Mezieres induced him in 1923 to revise and amplify it into a full-scale modern oratorio, the first of his numerous stage works. Together with Jeanne d'Arc au bucher, Le roi David remains among Honegger's best-known and loved compositions.

Honegger was born of Swiss parents in Le Havre, France, March 10, 1892. His musical education was centered in Switzerland and France. Although he stands linked with Poulenc and Milhaud as a member of Les Six. his association with them was rather tenuous. His musical temperament tended toward the production of music less characterized by the fairground and music hall derivatives embraced by Les Six in their revolt against Wagnerian romanticism and Debussean impressionism and more toward a strong liking for grave tragic subjects allowing scope for monumental treatment. Honegger's style integrates within his developed sense of the dramatic and theatrical, significant harmonic and rhythmic invention coupled with directness of expression through the use of a large measure of contrapuntal skill as well as of simple folk-like melodies. This style has evolved out of a masterly combination

of disparate international musical elements.

King David comprises in its three parts a narrative survey of and a musical commentary on the high points of the Jewish monarch's life. It commences with his selection and annointing by Samuel, his defeat of Goliath and the subsequent interaction with the doomed Saul and Jonathan, his flight from Saul's jealousy and his refusal to lay hands on the Lord's annointed when opportunity put Saul in his power. It proceeds to his glorification with the triumphant entrance of the Ark of the Covenant into the new capital, Jerusalem, his lapse into adultery with Bathsheba, the tragic revolt of Absolom, the disastrous results of the census-taking decision, and finally his last testament as he sinks toward Sheol.

The twenty-seven segments, mostly of selected and cogent prose recitation, weave a succinct historical background permitting orchestra, chorus and soloists to take flight as they give expression to a kaleidoscopic interplay of emotion. Indeed, throughout the oratorio, all forces, but especially the orchestra, are used with great coloristic skill. The orchestra furnishes that often barbaric and oriental palette against which the fierce martial scenes are set. With masterly suggestion it depicts the magical evocation of Samuel from the underworld by the Witch of Endor and gives ecstatic expression in dance to the joy of the Israelite processional with the Ark. And it provides accompaniment to the lyrical solos and choral laments in those passages reflective either of David's own reactions to his situation or of biblical judgments on them. King David is an outstanding modern oratorio.

WHO'S

Music Director of both the Roger Wagner Chorale and the Los Angeles Master Chorale and Sinfonia Orchestra, ROGER WAGNER is known the world over as a symbol of the highest achievements in choral art. Dedicated to choral music since early childhood, his international reputation in that area has been enhanced by his work as a composer, arranger, and symphonic conductor, and he is a highly regarded authority on the religious music of the medieval and renaissance periods. He has been knighted twice for his contributions to sacred music. Radio, television, motion pictures, and recordings have all played an important part in his long and illustrious career. He has recorded over 60 albums and received the Grammy Award for his album, Virtuoso. In addition to directing the Los Angeles Master Chorale and Sinfonia Orchestra, Roger Wagner has been guest conductor of the Los Angeles Philharmonic and has appeared with leading orchestras all over the world.

The LOS ANGELES MASTER CHORALE and SINFONIA ORCHESTRA, founded by Roger Wagner and the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce, became a resident company of the Music Center in 1964. Dr. Wagner has been Music Director of the organization since its formation. Now embarking on its 17th season, the 125-voice ensemble is one of the finest in the United States and includes in its select membership the outstanding professional talent in the Southland.

The Master Chorale presented its first concert season at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion In 1965, receiving significant critical acclaim. Under the leadership of Dr. Wagner, the Chorale has continued to present concert seasons of the world's choral masterworks at the Music Center, giving Los Angeles a unique reputation as the only city in the country supporting its own professional resident chorus in an annual series of choral programs.

Two seasons ago the Master Chorale joined the Los Angeles Philharmonic for the inaugural concert of Music Director Carlo Maria Giulini, in Beethoven's Symphony No. 9. The performance was carried live on public television and transmitted via satellite throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Mexico.

In addition to its own nine-concert season during 1980-81 at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, the Los Angeles Master Chorale will perform some three dozen chamber concerts around the city for senior and disabled audiences. With the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Chorale will perform the Mahler Symphony No. 3, the Rossini Stabat Mater, and the Mendelssohn Midsummer Nights Dream in a total of eleven concerts at the Music Center.

RABBI EDGAR F. MAGNIN was born July 1, 1890 in San Francisco. Already proficient in Hebrew at age 10 and having decided to become a great rabbi, he was determined that a church or synagogue should serve a pragmatic function. With this in mind he pursued studies at the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati while studying at the University of Cincinatti, where he was graduated in 1913.

Ordained in 1914, he subsequently became rabbi of Temple Israel in Stockton, California. The following year he moved to the Wilshire Boulevard Temple in Los Angeles where he began plans for the magnificent structure which stands today. The Temple was dedicated in 1929 and under Rabbi Magnin's leadership it has become a symbol of progressive Judaism, growing from 400 families then to 2,750 today.

Rabbi Magnin was a founding member of the United Crusade and USO in Los Angeles; and he has also served on the boards of the Hollywood Bowl, Boy Scouts, Cancer Prevention Society and the Cedars Sinai Medical Center. Recently elected President of the prestigious World Affairs Council, the Rabbi is also a thirty-third degree Mason and has been saluted by the LAPD, the Navy league, B'Nai B'Rith and the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Baritone PAUL HINSHAW has received acclaim as soloist with many symphony orchestras, including the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra and the San Francisco Symphony. Mr. Hinshaw has appeared in concerts and oratorio with most of the leading musical organizations on the West Coast. For the past two years he has been performing with the American Ballet Theatre in New York, San Francisco and Los Angeles where he received high critical praise for his singing of several song cycles by Gustav Mahler that have been choreographed for that company.

A member of the Los Angeles Master Chorale and The Roger Wagner Chorale, Mr. Hinshaw has been the featured soloist on national tours and State Department-sponsored tours to Latin America, the Middle East and Russia. This summer he toured Japan and recorded with the Roger Wagner Chorale. His most recent appearance at the Music Center with the Los Angeles Master Chorale was as Dr. Falke in Die Fledermaus last spring. Mr. Hinshaw has performed the Bloch Sacred Service with Roger Wagner over 200 times all over the United States and South America.

Lyric tenor JONATHAN MACK earned a Bachelor of Music degree in French horn from the University of Southern California in 1971, where he also received the School of Music Alumni Award as Outstanding Undergraduate. As a singer (he completed his Master of Music Degree in voice at USC in 1974), his vast experience includes appearances with the orchestras of Los

Angeles and Minnesota, with both the Western Opera Theatre and the Merola Program of the San Francisco Opera, Opera Midwest, the Los Angeles Opera Repertory Theatre, the Ojai Festival, the Carmel Bach Festival, Monday Evening Concerts, and the Roger Wagner Chorale. His recordings as soloist include *La Dafne*, Brahms and Schumann choral lieder, and the Brahms *Liebeslieder Waltzes*.

Mezzo Soprano BETTY MORRISON graduated from Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona with a major in vocal performance. As a member of the Central City Opera Co. she participated in a weekly television show in Phoenix, Arizona. A member of both the Los Angeles Master Chorale and the Roger Wagner Chorale for nine years, she has appeared with the Los Angeles Philharmonic as soloist in Verdi's Four Sacred Pieces at the Hollywood Bowl. Miss Morrison has also soloed with the Pasadena Chorale in the Verdi Requiem. She toured the United States with the Roger Wagner Chorale in November, 1979 and in January and February, 1980.

NANCY OBRIEN was born in Los Angeles, completed the degrees of B.A. and M.A. at UCLA, and has pursued advanced musical studies at USC. As soloist for the Los Angeles Master Chorale, and the Roger Wagner Chorale, Miss OBrien has toured the U.S.S.R., Israel, Europe, and South America. Appearances with the Ojai Festival, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Long Beach Symphony, the Monday Evening Concerts of the LACMA, and the Los Angeles-based chamber ensemble I Cantori have occupied Miss OBrien recently. She is currently instructor of piano and voice at El Camino College. She is a former member of the UCLA Opera Workshop, and studied at the Hochschule für Music in Freiburg, Germany.

Soprano KARI WINDINGSTAD has sung to critical acclaim throughout North and South America. She began her professional career as a member of the world famous New York Pro Musica, after receiving training at Stanford University in early music performance practice. Following several successful tours with Pro Musica she attended the Music Academy of the West where she studied opera and song literature.

Miss Windingstad has sung with conductors Robert Page, Robert Shaw, and Michael Tilson Thomas, and she has joined Roger Wagner for eight national and international tours. She has appeared with the Dayton, Oakland, Seattle, and Vancouver Symphonies, the Prague Chamber Orchestra, and last season made her debut with the Los Angeles Philharmonic in Berg's Lulu Suite.

Her operatic repertoire includes Cosi fan Tutte, The Marriage of Figaro, Romeo and Juliet, Orpheus in the Underworld, Dialogues of the Carmelites, Gianni Schicchi, and Scarlatti's La Griselda.
