## PROGRAM NOTES

by Richard H. Trame, S.J., Ph.D.

The 1992 Christmas concert fittingly commences with a robust processional based on the German tune of 1360, *Personet hodie*. Famed University of North Carolina composer and arranger Lara Hoggard created this stirring arrangement for organ, brass, percussion and chorus for the carol found in the *Piae cantiones* collection, compiled in 1582 by the Finn Theodore Petrus, and long used by the Lutheran churches of Sweden and Finland.

The contemporary German composer Franz Biebl's *Ave Maria* may at first seem but another setting of the Angelic Salutation. However, its subtitle *Angelus* indicates that the *Ave Maria* segment is repeated after the versicles and responses of this ancient daily commemoration of Gabriel's annunciation of the Savior, Mary's acceptance of the Incarnate Word, and its fulfillment.

The increasingly prominent Minneapolisbased composer Stephen Paulus, perhaps best known for his opera *The Postman Always Rings Twice*, has composed an attractive modern carol *A Savior From On High*, its words by the 17th century poet William Ballet. *What Sweeter Music*, also known as Herrick's carol, derives its melody from a Christmas play found in the *Cologne Songbook* of 1623. The poem set was taken from Robert Herrick's collection *Hesperides* and sung in 1647 at the palace of Whitehall before the ill-fated King Charles 1.

Maestro Salamunovich has chosen a work by the now prominent and well-known Mack Wilberg. Tres cantus laudendi gives expression to Christmas joy through excerpts from three traditional psalms of rejoicing. Psalm 100 Jubilate Deo and Psalm 113 Laudate pueri were commissioned and performed by the Utah Symphony and Chorus in 1989. Psalm 150 Laudate Dominum premiered in 1990 at Brigham Young University. These psalms are scored for three each of trumpets, horns, trombones, a tuba, percussion, organ and chorus, and are sung without break.

The well-beloved Advent hymn O Come, O Come, Emmanuel originated as a French processional hymn of the 15th century. The familiar Latin version Veni, veni, Emmanuel appeared in the Little Cologne Psalter of 1710. J.M. Neale supplied the English translation for Thomas Helmore's adaptation of the tune in 1854. The 19th century American hymn composer Lowell Mason (1792-1872) adapted and arranged a melody from the works of George Frederic Handel (1685-1759). He utilized a poem by Isaac Watts (1674-1748) for Joy to the World!. Mason's carol has seen many adroit, jubilant and challenging arrangements. It serves as a fitting close to the first half of the choral program.

John Rutter, one of modern England's premier living composers, provides the arrangements for the next four carols, sung without break.

Adolphe-Charles Adam (1803-1856), a successful French composer of opera, is probably best known for his enduringly popular ballet Giselle as well as his Cantique de Noël (O Holy Night), set to words by Coppeau De Roquemaure. Rutter's brilliant arrangement gives full scope to the famed aria's florid 19th century romanticism. Away in a Manger boasts two familiar carol tunes, both of American origin. The tune sung for this program was composed by James R. Murray (1841-1905). Both versions set a text by John Thomas McFarland (1851-1913). The Holly and the Ivy may be designated as either a Nativity, Lenten or Autumnal carol. Rutter also brilliantly arranged the Gloucestershire Carol, dedicating it to the choir of Clare College, Cambridge. Go Tell it on the Mountain's tune exists in several variant versions. The respected Black composer and arranger John W. Work, Jr. (1871-1925) derived the melody from folk materials, composing and setting the familiar stanzas. Rutter's variation was selected from personal preference.

O Come Little Children, an original German Christmas song, was composed by Johann Abraham Peter Schultz (1747-1800), a composer of operas, operettas and religious works. Johann von Schmidt provided this ingratiating children's melody with its text. The present arrangement was made by James Fritschel, noted American arranger/composer, recently emeritus at California Lutheran University. Composer J.D. Miller in What Shall We Give utilizes a traditional Catalonian folk-melody. In the text those approaching the manger will bring raisins, olives, nuts and sweets for the Infant. A traditional French carol, What is This Fragrance finds its lovely sentiments translated by Werner Grams in William Averitt's arrangement. Designated as a traditional Bohemian carol, The Angels and the Shepherds in Stephen Paulus' arrangement for chorus, handbells or piano, and flute is furnished with an English poem of Helen Dickenson.

With its melody also known as "Sunny Bank," Englishmen sang the words to *I Saw Three Ships* all over their country prior to its publication in 1833. The three ships symbolize the journey and arrival of Joseph, Mary and the Child in Bethlehem, fitting nautical terminology for the island nation of England.

The melody of the ever popular Hark! the Herald Angels Sing comes from Mendelssohn's Festgesang written in 1840 for male chorus and orchestra in celebration of the Gutenberg Festival commemorating the four-hundredth anniversary of the invention of moveable type. Mendelssohn's melody was in 1886 adapted and set to words of Samuel Wesley (1739) by W.H. Cummings. Robert D. Hunter's arrangement serves as an exhilarating climax for a festive Christmas concert.

## PROFILES

PAUL SALAMUNOVICH was appointed Music Director of the Los Angeles Master Chorale in 1991 and is only the third maestro to lead the chorus since its inception. The 1992-93 season marks his second at the helm of the renowned choir.

His association with the Los Angeles Master Chorale dates from the organization's founding. A Los Angeles native, he became a charter member of the Los Angeles Concert Youth Chorus in 1946, which evolved into the Roger Wagner Chorale in 1949. When Wagner established the Los Angeles Master Chorale in 1964, he was appointed Assistant Conductor and served in that capacity until 1977. He also appeared as guest conductor with the chorus


in 1975 and 1986.

During his career, Salamunovich has conducted choruses throughout North America, Europe, and Australia and has prepared choirs for such notable conductors at Stravinsky, Shaw, Ormandy, Nelson, Wallenstein, Solti and Mehta.

He also arranged and conducted choral segments for the soundtracks of such motion pictures as *The Great Imposter*, Universal, 1960; *Trouble with Angels*, Columbia, 1965; *Angel in My Pocket*, Universal, 1965; *The Last of Sheila*, Warner Brothers, 1973; *True Confessions*, Chartoff and Winkler, 1981; *Flatliners*, Columbia, 1990; *Grand Canyon*, Columbia 1991; and the 1992 Francis Ford Coppola production of *Dracula*.

An esteemed music educator, Salamunovich was on the faculty of Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles for 27 years, and was promoted to Professor in 1980, a position he held until his recent appointment to Music Director of the Chorale. In 1991, he received an honorary doctorate from the University of Saint Thomas in Minnesota.

In addition to his work with the Chorale, Salamunovich continues to serve as Director of Music at Saint Charles Borremeo Church in North Hollywood, a position he has held since 1949. Under his direction the choir has made numerous recordings and has been featured in several televised Christmas specials. In 1988, the Saint Charles Borremeo Choir became the



first American choir to be invited to sing the Mass for the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul at the Vatican where they performed the Vaughan Williams *Mass in G Minor* for an investiture ceremony for new cardinals and archbishops from throughout the world.

Salamunovich also continues to lead the Saint Charles Children's Choir which has performed with the Los Angeles Master Chorale, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the San Francisco and Los Angeles Opera Companies, and for NBC-TV with the late Lucille Ball. Under his aegis, the choir recorded the classic Walt Disney album "It's a Small World."

Salamunovich is a voting member of the American Choral Directors Association, an Honorary Life Member of both the Southern California Vocal Association and the Choral Conductors Guild of California, an organization that recently recognized him "for excellence in choral music at a national level."

He resides in North Hollywood with his wife, Dorothy, and has four sons and four grandchildren.

The human voice raised in song is, perhaps, the most powerful and compelling instrument ever created. Lauded for its distinctive sound and incredible capacity to express emotions, the 124-voice LOS ANGELES MASTER CHORALE has evoked smiles, tears and awe from audiences around the globe for 29 years and has been described by critics with such celestial terms as otherworldly, transcendent and ethereal. The ensemble was recently honored by Los Angeles Magazine and KCOP-TV (Channel 13) as "The Best Choir in Los Angeles."

During its 1992-93 season at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion the Chorale will present ten concerts. Highlights will include the world premiere of *Cantares Argentinos* by Lalo Schifrin, commissioned by the Master Chorale, and the Los Angeles premiere of *Te Deum* by Dominick Argento. During the 1992-93 season, the Chorale will also make several appearances with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and will serve as the chorus in the Los Angeles Music Center Opera productions of *Tosca* and *Lucia*

di Lammermoor. In March, the Chorale will be the featured choir at the biennial convention of the American Choral Directors Association, which will be held in San Antonio, Texas, and is expected to draw some 6,000 people. Other engagements will include appearing as part of the cultural series at the Point Loma Nazarene College in San Diego, and, in June 1993, the Chorale will host the prestigious Chorus America National Conference marking the first time the conference has been held in Los Angeles in more than a decade.

Founded in 1964 by Conductor Roger Wagner with the assistance of local businessmen Z. Wayne Griffin and Louis D. Statham, and the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Chorale gained instant recognition

as one of the nation's premiere professional choirs. It became one of the first resident companies of the Los Angeles Music Center and helped Los Angeles establish a reputation as a cultural capital when it opened its own series at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion on January 27, 1965 with its critically- acclaimed performance of Bach's *Mass in B Minor*.

Since its inception, the choir has continuously presented a concert series at the Music Center and has given world premieres to more than a dozen works. It also serves as the chorus for the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Music Center Opera, and has appeared with many of the world's leading orchestras during tours of the United States and the Soviet Union. In 1973, the Chorale was invited to sing

with Eugene Ormandy's Philadelphia Orchestra at the Presidential Inauguration Concert at the Kennedy Center.

In addition to its touring engagements, the Chorale has brought to its own podium such renowned guest conductors as Aaron Copland, Margaret Hillis, John Nelson, Robert Page, Helmuth Rilling, Robert Shaw, Alfred Wallenstein, Albert McNeil and Richard Westenburg. Under Maestros Zubin Mehta, Carlo Maria Giulini and André Previn, the Chorale produced six recordings with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. It also provides extensive education and outreach programs which serve more than 15,000 youths in the Southland's public schools each year.

Roger Wagner, the Chorale's first Music Director, served in the post until 1985. Paul Salamunovich was appointed Music Director in 1991 and is only the third maestro to lead the venerable organization. An eminent choral clinician and music professor, he has also arranged and conducted the choral segments of numerous motion picture soundtracks for such studios as Columbia, Universal and Warner Brothers. He was a member of the faculty of Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles for 27 years and was promoted to Professor in 1980, a position he held until his appointment to the Chorale.

Maestro Salamunovich succeeded John Currie of Edinburgh, Scotland who served as Music Director from 1986-1991. During his tenure, Currie conducted such masterpieces as Benjamin Britten's War Requiem and Beethoven's Missa Solemnis. Under his leadership, the Chorale also achieved distinction performing with such acclaimed conductors as Simon Rattle, Zubin Mehta, Pierre Boulez, André Previn, Esa-Pekka Salonen and Kurt Sanderling.

Founded in 1982, SOLID BRASS is rapidly establishing itself as one of the most exciting brass ensembles in America. Unique in its ver-
