PROGRAM NOTES by Richard H. Trame, S.J., Ph.D.

The robust processional Personet L hodie, arranged by famed North Carolinian Lara Hoggard, fittingly opens this Christmas Concert. The Latin carol originated approximately 1360 as a parody of a medieval song sung by children on December 6, the feast of St. Nicholas (Santa Claus) and later on December 28, the feast of the Holy Innocents. The modern liturgical composer Hermann Schroeder (1930-91) wrote a vigorous and triumphant Magnificat utilizing Gregorian chant melodies, clear polyphonic lines, restrained lyricism and modern harmonies, a model of liturgical propriety. Contemporary UCLA professor-composer Alden Ashforth utilizes time-honored Latin texts, for which he has made his own alternate English translations, to create three stunning Christmas motets. Hodie Christus natus est (Today Christ is born) is the antiphon for the Magnificat at Christmas vespers. O magnum mysterium (O great mystery) has inspired many composers since the 16th century. Viderunt omnes (All peoples witness) derives its text from Psalm 98 and is the gradual for the Mass of Christmas Day.

California-based composer Conrad Susa is familiar to Master Chorale audiences since his Christmas Garland was performed in 1991. In this concert his Christmas in the Southwest, Carols and Lullabies is presented. These Hispanic folk-carols have a naive quality as they trace the journey of Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem's inn and manger. The selections also depict the birth of the child, the loving adoration of the caring Mary. the advent of the shepherds with the gifts and the ringing out of joyous bells. Ding Dong Merrily on High did not originate as a French noël, as is often thought, but as a dance tune by Thoinot Arbeau. He published his dance collection in Orchesographie in 1596. The tune was turned into a carol by the English clergyman George Ratcliffe Woodward and the Anglo-Irish composer Charles Wood.

In his Carol Fantasy collection, the highly talented Mark Riese (1953-89) created an excellent choral arrangement of God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen. The tune found many counterparts in several continental countries. The text which appears in Bramley and Stainer's Christmas Carols, Old and New (1871) is derived from an early 19th century London street broadside. Contemporary composer Donald Waxman has incorporated five well-known carols in his An English Noel. The four presented here include Green Growth The Holly which utilizes a melody attributed to King Henry VIII but with a text elaborated in the 19th century by Lady Mary Trefusis. The Boar's Head carol, probably of Norse origin, dates from the 14th century. Boar's head feasts became particularly popular between Christmas and Candlemas day (February 2) and were centered around Queen's College, Oxford, where the song was adapted as a carol. The Coventry Carol (Lully, lulla Thou Little Tiny Child), emerges from the medieval mystery play performed each year at the festival of The Shearsman and Tailors. The Wassail Song is one of three famed English greeting songs sung by carolers carrying a festively decorated punch bowl. This wassail prevailed in northern England, especially in Yorkshire. Its first eight measures are similar to that of God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen.

Roger Wagner's (1914-1992) Christmas Story binds together in his own arrangements several familiar carols separated by narrative excerpts from St. Luke's Gospel. We Three Kings, composed by John Henry Hopkins, Rector of Christ Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania achieved great popularity became it boasts a melody of great clarity and simplicity. Always very popular in the United States is What Child is This?, based on the 1642 melody Greensleeves. It received its text in 1865 from William Chatterton Dix.

After a visit to the Holy Land in 1865, American Episcopal Bishop Philip Brooks wrote the poem *O Little Town of Bethlehem.* After many tries at a melody, his


organist Lewis Redner (1831-1908) awoke on Christmas morn in 1868 with the fully-formed melody ringing in his ears. The American tune was first sung on December 27, 1868. Gesù Bambino was composed in 1917 for the St. Patrick's Cathedral Choir in New York and has become Pietro Yon's (1886-1943) most famous and enduringly loved work. It serves as an excellent example of a newly composed carol from ethnically mixed America. Angels We Have Heard on High derives its text from a poem written by James Chadwick, Catholic Bishop of Hexham and Newcastle. He utilized an 18th century French Noël probably from Lorraine. The carol was first published in the 1860 collection Holu Family Hymns.

The Virgin's Slumber Song in its origins may reach back to Elizabethan times. Joy to the World! is classified as a Dissenters (non-Anglican Protestant) repeating carol using the tune "Antioch" and setting Isaac Watts' paraphrase of Psalm 98. Its melody has wrongly been described as having been arranged by Handel.

The story of how Fathers Franz Gruber and Joseph Mohr hurriedly composed Silent Night for choir and guitar because their Obendorf parish organ had completely broken down from old age is a fable. The organ was still functioning for many subsequent years. What Gruber and Mohr did in composing Silent Night was a normal and quite usual procedure among Austrian church musicians, they composed an Austrian folk-like melody for Christmas Mass. Their distinction, however, is that they composed probably the most enduring, famous and beloved carol. Indeed, after 1818 Gruber made numerous adaptations of Silent Night including arrangements for small and large orchestra. This performance concludes with an arrangement by local composer Paul Sjolund.

PAUL SALAMUNOVICH was appointed Music Director of the Los Angeles Master Chorale in 1991 and is only the third maestro to lead the chorus since its inception. The 1993-1994 season marks his third at the helm of this renowned choir.

His association with the Master Chorale dates from the organization's founding. A Los Angeles native, he became a charter member of the Los Angeles Concert Youth Chorus in 1946, which evolved into the Roger Wagner Chorale in 1949. When Wagner established the Los Angeles Master Chorale in 1964, he was appointed Assistant Conductor and served in that capacity until 1977. He also appeared as guest conductor of the Chorale in 1975 and 1986.

During his career, Salamunovich has conducted choruses, workshops and seminars throughout North America, Europe and Australia and has prepared choirs for such notable conductors as Stravinsky, Wallenstein, van Beinum, Ormandy, Solti, Mehta, Shaw, Salonen and Rattle.

He has also conducted the Master Chorale for motion picture soundtracks, the most recent being *Grand Canyon*, 20th Century Fox, 1991; and the 1992 Francis Ford Coppola production of *Dracula*.An esteemed music educator, Salamunovich was on the faculty of Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles for 27 years, and was promoted to Professor in 1980, serving as such until his appointment as Music Director of the Chorale. He also holds honorary doctorates from both the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota and Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles.

PROFILES

In addition to his work with the Chorale, Salamunovich continues to serve as Director of Music at St. Charles Borromeo Church in North Hollywood, a position he has held since 1949. Under his direction this choir has also recorded soundtracks for motion pictures and has been featured in several televised specials. In 1988, the St. Charles Choir became the only American choir ever to be invited to sing the Mass for the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul at the Vatican. where they performed the Vaughan Williams Mass in G Minor, with the Pope presiding, for the investiture ceremony of new cardinals and archbishops from throughout the world.

Salamunovich also continues to lead the St. Charles Children's Choir, which has performed with the Master Chorale, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and the San Francisco and New York Opera Companies. Under his aegis, they also recorded the classic Walt Disney album "It's a Small World".

He resides in North Hollywood with his wife, Dorothy, and has four sons and four grandchildren.



RHONDA FLEMING, Special Guest, has appeared in over 40 motion pictures including such classics as Spellbound, Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court and Gunfight at the OK Corral. She starred on Broadway in The Women, in Kismet at The Music Center and made her stage musical debut in Las Vegas at the new Tropicana Hotel. She has performed at the Hollywood Bowl in a Cole Porter concert and starred in a national concert tour featuring the music of George Gershwin. Rhonda currently devotes much of her time to the new Rhonda Fleming Mann Resource Center for Women with Cancer at UCLA. This unique center provides psychosocial care to women and their families to help lessen the emotional burdens created by cancer. She is a dedicated supporter of Childhelp USA, World Opportunities International, The Music Center and many other organizations. She is married to Ted Mann, producer and founder of Mann Theatres.

Founded in 1964 by the late Roger Wagner, the LOS ANGELES MASTER CHORALE, under the direction of Paul Salamunovich, celebrates its 30th anniversary with the 1993-1994 season. The 120-voice Chorale is recognized as one of the nation's pre-eminent choral groups and has been described as "a major cultural asset to the City (Los Angeles)", by Martin Bernheimer, Music Critic for the Los Angeles Times. As an independent and flexible ensemble, it is the largest choral organization of its kind in the United States.

Since its inaugural performance in the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion on January 27, 1965, the Master Chorale has continued to present its own concert series with its orchestra, the Los Angeles Sinfonia. As the resident chorus of The Music Center of Los Angeles, the Master Chorale also serves as chorus for the Los Angeles Philharmonic and, for two productions each season, the Music Center Opera. It has appeared with many of the world's leading orchestras during tours of the United States and the Soviet Union and was invited, in 1973, to sing with Eugene Ormandy's Philadelphia Orchestra at the Presidential inauguration concert at the Kennedy Center.

The Master Chorale has commissioned and performed many world premieres, the latest being Lalo Schifrin's *Cantares Argentinos* (1992-1993). During this 30th anniversary season, the Chorale will present seven concerts, two *Messiah Sing-Alongs*, and the "Albert McNeil Jubilee Singers" as guest choir. Highlights will include Mendelssohn's *Elijah*; "An American Collection" featuring Morton Gould's *Tolling* and *Solfegging* along with a commissioned work by David Baker; appearances by actress Rhonda Fleming as narrator for *The Christmas Story*; a concert of major works by Mozart and Haydn; an evening of "Choral Masterpieces" during which the Chorale will be joined by members of ten Southern California university choirs during the second half; and finally, the *Carmina Burana* of Orff and *Nänie* of Brahms. The season will emphasize the Chorale's virtuosity with repertoire that ranges from the classic to the Broadway stage.

In March of 1993 the Chorale was the featured choir at the Biennial National Convention of the American Choral Directors Association held in San Antonio, Texas and, in June, 1993 hosted the prestigious Chorus America National Conference. Members of the Master Chorale also appeared on the international broadcast of the 1993 Grammy Awards ceremony. Under Maestros Esa-Pekka Salonen, John Mauceri, André Previn, Carlo Maria Guilini, and Zubin Mehta, the Chorale has made ten recordings with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra.

The Chorale's extensive education and outreach programs serve more than 16,500 students throughout Southern California with a special in-school touring program and the largest annual High School Choir Festival in the State.

Roger Wagner, the Master Chorale's first Music Director, served in that capacity until 1986 after which he became Music Director Laureate until his death in September, 1992. John Currie of Edinburgh, Scotland, led the Chorale from 1986-1991. Paul Salamunovich was appointed Music Director in 1991 as only the third maestro to lead the Master Chorale.
