PROGRAM NOTES

ost commentators discussing Menjamin Britten's (1913-1976) entrancing Ceremony of Carols elaborate on their essentially medieval characteristics. In contrast to more familiar modern carols which are clothed in romantic harmonic garb, Britten strove to capture in his selections a more English religious feeling. To this end, he stressed various medieval compositional devices including subtle harmonies and scored for semi-liturgical boys voices. Of the nine selected poems, five are by anonymous poets, one each by the 16th century Scottish balladeers, James, John and Robert Wedderburn and one by the obscure William Cornish. Two of the poems are by the brilliant recusant Jesuit, Robert Southwell. All of the poetry is framed by the antiphon to the Magnificat for the second vespers of Christmas Hodie Christus natus est. Britten composed his Ceremony as he crossed the Atlantic during the dark days of 1942 while returning to England from the United States. The work is scored for treble voices and harp. The harp also provides a meditative interlude.

Morten Lauridsen writes "When Los Angeles Master Chorale Board Chair Marshall Rutter asked me to compose a new work for the Christmas concert in honor of his wife. Terry Knowles, my thoughts went immediately to that most beautiful text, O magnum mysterium. For centuries, composers including Palestrina and Victoria have been inspired by the juxtaposition of the birth of the new-born King amongst the lowly animals and shepherds. This affirmation of God's grace to the meek and the adoration of the Blessed Virgin is celebrated in my setting through a quiet song of profound inner joy.'

In his ancestry, Daniel Pinkham (b. 1923) hails from a Yankee family of religious philosophers, educators and commercial industrialists. His father was president of the famed patent medicine firm. Such worthies as Walter Piston, Aaron Copland, Archibald Davison and Nadia Boulanger edu-


cated Pinkham and assisted him in becoming a celebrated composer. His achievements have won him membership in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Sturdy architectural structure, energetic polyphony and chromatic harmony characterize much of his style. He has long manifested interest in Baroque music, resulting in his neo-baroque and everpopular Christmas Cantata (1965). His choice of Latin for the text imparts a universality and objectivity to the work. Its three movements are sung without pause and is scored for mixed chorus with organ and brass accompaniment.

The Argentinian composer Ariel Ramírez (b. 1921) specializes in preserving and using his native land's folk music. As in his famed Misa Criolla (1963), he composed a folk drama in 1965 entitled Navidad Nuestra (Our Christmas) using the rhythms and traditions of Hispanic America. This criollo retable (native tableau) - on a poem by Felix Luna - has the whole Christmas pageant expressed in a popular manner and exhibits the spirit of ordinary people. These tableaus exhibit a distinctive regional flavor with a chamane for the Annunciation to Mary, a huella pampena for the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem, a vidala catamarqueno for the birth of Christ. The Adoration of the Shepherds utilizes a chaya riojana rhythm, while the scene of the Three Kings is in takirari tempo. The Flight to Egypt exhibits a vidala tucmana rhythmic structure. All but one of these characteristically Latin rhythms are in triple time. Ramírez' popular melodic gifts combined with Luna's tender and simple verses give Navidad Nuestra a universal appeal. The work is scored for mixed chorus, soloists, bongos, guitar and harpsichord.

A Christmas Garland, by the effective and innovative composer Conrad Susa, received its premiere in Columbus, Ohio in December of 1988. It was much acclaimed when performed by the Los Angeles Master Chorale in December of 1991. Susa has noted that the glittering introduction (cries of Noel) serves as a garland to God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen in which the

angels announce the message of comfort and joy. The accompaniment dances into The Holly and the Ivy as the chorus sings I Saw Three Ships asking "what was in these ships all three?" According to old legend the answer given is We Three Kings of Orient Are. Arriving at the manger, the kings find the Christ child being soothed by The Coventry Carol and O Come, All Ye Faithful. Celebration breaks out with Joy to the World humorously "deconstructed" to manifest the carol's relationship to several of Handel's works. Noels then return in all-embracing triumph to conclude this attractive garland.

PROFILES



PAUL SALAMUNOVICH appointed Music Director of the Los Angeles Master Chorale in 1991 and is only the third maestro to lead the chorus since its inception. His association with the Master Chorale dates from its founding. A Los Angeles native, he became a charter member of the Los Angeles Concert Youth Chorus in 1946, which evolved into the Roger Wagner Chorale in 1949. When the Los Angeles Master Chorale was established in 1964, Salamunovich was appointed the Assistant Conductor, serving in that capacity until 1977. He appeared as a guest conductor with the Master Chorale in 1975 and 1986.

An esteemed music educator, Salamunovich was on the faculty of Loyola Marymount University for 27 years.

He holds honorary doctorates from the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota and from Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. He was the first recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award presented by MidAmerica Productions at Carnegie Hall. In the Summer of 1994, he was the Honoree of the Hollywood Bowl Patroness Committee.

Throughout his career Salamunovich has conducted choruses, workshops and seminars throughout North America, the Caribbean, Europe and Australia. He has prepared choirs for such notable conductors as Stravinsky, Wallenstein, van Beinum, Ormandy, Solti, Mehta, Shaw, Salonen, Rattle and Norrington. He has conducted choral segments on numerous motion picture soundtracks for such studios as Columbia, Paramount, 20th Century Fox, Universal and Warner Bros.

In addition to his work with the Master Chorale, Salamunovich continues to serve as Director of Music at St. Charles Borromeo Church in North Hollywood, a position he has held since 1949. Over the years, they have sung at many of the major liturgical celebrations for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. The St. Charles Choir has been privileged to sing for Pope John Paul II on three occasions, the most recent being in 1988 when they performed the Vaughan Williams Mass in G Minor at the Vatican on the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul at an investiture ceremony of new cardinals and archbishops from throughout the world.

Salamunovich resides in North Hollywood with his wife, Dorothy, and has four sons and five grandchildren.

MORTEN LAURIDSEN, Composer in Residence, is currently one of America's most widely performed composers. His three choral cycles, the Midwinter Songs on poems by Robert Graves, Madrigali; Six "Firesongs" on Italian Renaissance Poems and Les Chansons des Roses on poems by Rilke, have become standard works in the literature and are featured regularly by distinguished ensembles such as the Dale Warland and Elmer Iseler Singers, the Pacific Chorale and the San Francisco Symphony Chorus in venues including



Kennedy Center and Carnegie Hall. A CD of all three works, recorded on the Freshwater Classical label by Portland, Oregon's professional chamber chorus, Choral Cross-Ties, has been broadcast on the nationally syndicated radio program, "The First Art." The Choral Journal named Lauridsen's cycles as among the most outstanding American contemporary choral compositions, devoting an extended feature to them in a recent issue.

Lauridsen's two solo vocal cycles, A Winter Come (Moss) and Cuatro Canciones (Lorca) have been performed by vocalists including Paul Sperry, Rose Taylor, and Julianna Gondek and numerous contemporary music ensembles. His compositions have also been premiered by Canadian Brass trumpeter Ronald Romm, the Pasadena Chamber Orchestra and Tchaikovsky Gold Medalist Nathaniel Rosen, among others.

A recipient of numerous grants, prizes and commissions, Mr. Lauridsen is Professor and Chair of the Composition Department at the University of Southern California where he has been cited for teaching excellence and been the recipient of the Ramo Award as outstanding School of Music faculty member. He resides in the Hollywood Hills with his wife and three sons.

The LOS ANGELES CHILDREN'S CHORUS was formed in 1986 by Director Rebecca Thompson as a small group drawn from a few school and church choirs. It is now comprised of more than 150 girls and boys, ranging from eight to fifteen years of age, from all parts of the greater Los Angeles metropolitan area. The Chorus offers advanced training for young singers and encourages a deeper appreciation of choral art and the shared experience of creating fine choral music. Choristers, selected by annual spring auditions, are grouped by vocal and musical ability into Apprentice, Intermediate, and Concert Choirs.

The Chorus' concert repertoire varies widely - from established classical works to arrangements of folk songs from around the world. The Chorus performs in many languages, and often premieres compositions written specifically for children's voices. In demand for performances of major works for chorus and orchestra, they often appear on the stage on the Music Center of Los Angeles and in other concert halls. Performances have included Mahler's Third Symphony, Britten's War Requiem, Bach's St. Matthew Passion, and Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. Groups from the Chorus are often invited to perform on television, in movie soundtracks, and on stage in productions with the Los Angeles Music Center Opera. In 1990, the Chorus participated in an International Children's Choir Concert at Carnegie Hall in New York City, and in 1992 they joined choirs from Europe, Australia and Taiwan in the Central European Children's Choir Festival, performing in Vienna, Salzburg, Budapest and Innsbruck. The Los Angeles Children's Chorus has hosted visits to Los Angeles by, and performed with, the Leningrad (now St. Petersburg) Children's Choir, the Tapiola Choir of Finland, the Dawn Children's Choir of Moscow and The American Boychoir. In June 1994, the Chorus took first place honors in the competitive phase of the Princeton Invitational Choir Festival in Princeton, New Jersey. The Chorus will travel to Italy to participate in the Tuscany International Children's Chorus Festival in July 1995.

In October the Los Angeles Children's Chorus performed the "Bell Chorus" in the Mahler Third Symphony with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the women of the Los Angeles Master Chorale. Members of the Chorus will appear in the Los

Angeles Music Center Opera production of *Otello* in May 1995. In addition to performing with other organizations, the Chorus presents its own winter and Spring concerts in Pasadena.

Founded in 1964 by the late Roger Wagner, the LOS ANGELES MASTER CHORALE, under the direction of Paul Salamunovich, is in the midst of its 31st season. The 120-voice Chorale is recognized as one of the nation's pre-eminent choral groups and has been described as "a major cultural asset to the City of Los Angeles," by Martin Bernheimer, music critic for the Los Angeles Times. As an independent and flexible ensemble, it is the largest choral organization of its kind in the United States.

Since its first performance in the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion on January 27, 1965, the Chorale has continued to present an annual concert series with the Sinfonia Orchestra. As the resident chorus of The Music Center of Los Angeles County, the Chorale serves as the chorus for the Los Angeles Philharmonic and, for two productions each season, the Music Center Opera. The Chorale has appeared with many of the world's leading orchestras while touring the United States and the Soviet Union. They were invited to sing at the 1973 Presidential inauguration concert at the Kennedy Center with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy.


The Chorale has commissioned and performed many world premieres, the latest being David N. Baker's Images, Shadows and Dreams (1993-1994) as part of a three-year "Meet the Composers - Readers Digest Commissioning Program." During the 1994-1995 season, the Chorale will present seven concerts, two Messiah Sing-Alongs, and the Seoul Ladies' Singers as a guest choir. Highlights include guest soloist Claudine Carlson in An Evening of Brahms, Canciones para Los Angeles featuring Lalo Schifrin's Cantares Argentinos (LAMC 1992-1993 commission); Bach's St. John Passion with guest conductor Jon Washburn, the west coast premiere of Libby Larsen's Seven Ghosts (also part of the "Meet the Composers - Readers Digest Commissioning Program"); and special appearances by Tatyana M. Ali from "Fresh Prince of Bel Air" and the Los Angeles Children's Chorus for A Children's Holiday Celebration in support of the U.S. Committee for UNICEF. The 1994-1995 season emphasizes the best of international and American music integrated with the musical styles from cultures around the world.

In 1993, the Chorale was featured at the biennial national convention of the American Choral Directors Association, the Chorus America national conference, and the international broadcast of the Grammy awards. The Chorale has made ten recordings with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra under Esa-

Pekka Salonen, John Mauceri, André Previn, Carlo Maria Giulini, and Zubin Mehta.

The Chorale's extensive education and outreach programs serve more than 23,000 students throughout Southern California with in-school touring and California's largest annual High School Choir Festival.

Roger Wagner, founder, was the Chorale's Music Director until 1986, after which he became Music Director Laureate until his death in 1992. John Currie led the Chorale from 1986 to 1991. Paul Salamunovich was appointed Music Director in 1991, only the third to lead the Chorale in its 31-year history.
